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1. Callimachus *Aetia* fr. 9, 29, Pf.

..]γ[...] τελευτήσεις δρκια θυγατέρος.

νῦν γε Pfeiffer, ρίμφα Trypanis, πάντα Hunt. Has anyone thought of ζῶντα «in living force»? Cf. Soph. *O.T.* 482 and other citations by Liddell-Scott-Jones ζῶ II.

2. Posidippus in Loeb *Select Papyri* III (ed. Page) 114.16—7 (p. 474)

Πελλαῖον γένος ἀμόν· ἔσιμι δὲ βίβλον ἐλίσσων
ἀμφω λαοφόρωι κείμενος εἰν ἀγορῆι

The editor says “It is hard to believe that the text is sound here: ἀμφω has to mean with both hands”. Perhaps ἀμ φῶς («to the light»), however ungraceful metrically, might be an improvement.

3. Philo *In Flaccum* 36 Ἡν τις μεμηνώς δνομα Καραβᾶς οὐ τὴν ἀγρίαν καὶ θηριώδη μανίαν — ἀσκηπτος γάρ αὔτη γε καὶ τοῖς ἔχουσι καὶ τοῖς πλησιάζουσι...

For explanations and emendations of ἀσκηπτος, v. Colson, Loeb Philo IX 322—3. I suggest, very timorously, that this might be an old poetical (Aeschylean?) word, related to σκηπτός, with ἀ- not privative but prophetic, and meaning «catastrophic». Cf. for sense FVL MEN 5 in *Oxford Latin Dictionary* fasc. III.
